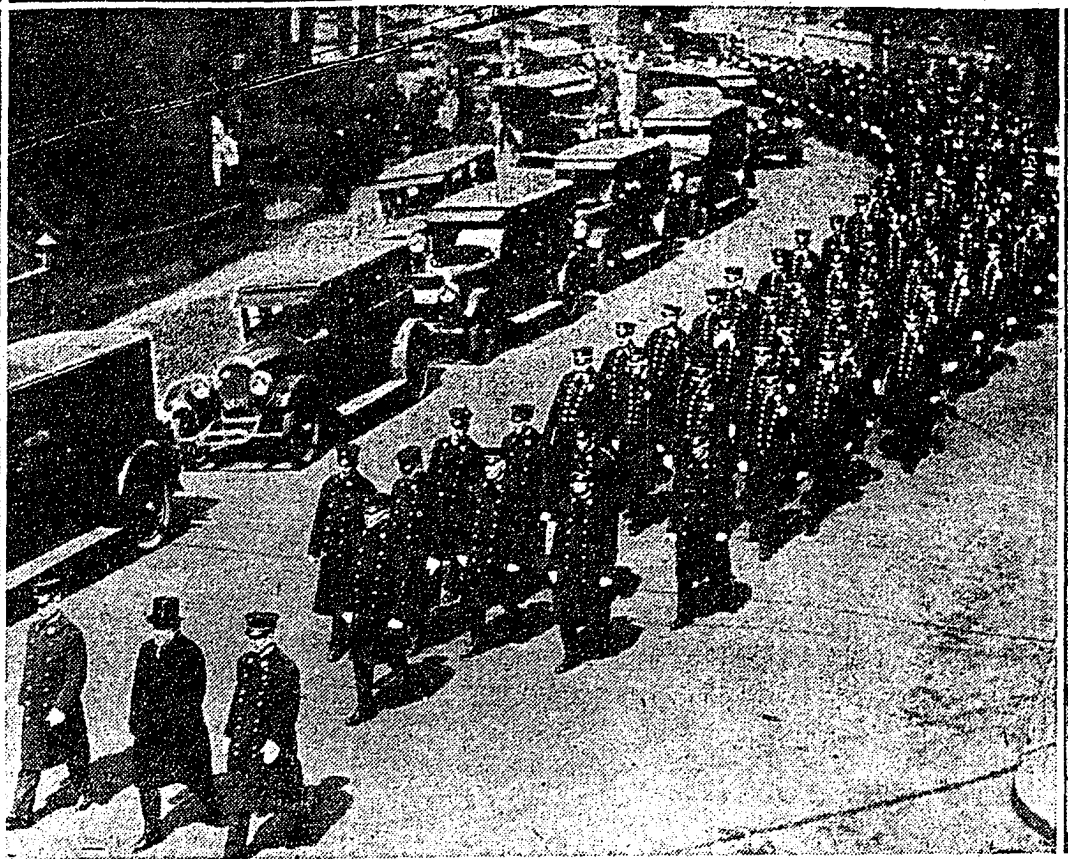


FUNERAL OF DISTRICT CHIEF E. L. McDONOUGH



CHIEF McDONOUGH'S FUNERAL PROCESSION MARCHING ALONG MONUMENT AV, DEPUTY CHIEF DOLAN, COMMISSIONER GLYNN AND CHIEF SENNOTT LEADING

District Chief Edward L. McDonough of the Boston Fire Department, who died Tuesday morning following a surgical operation in St Elizabeth's Hospital, was buried this morning after services in St Mary's Church, Warren st., Charlestown.

The church was thronged with mourners. A volunteer detail of officers and men of the Fire Department, headed by Fire Commissioner Theodore Glynn and Chief Daniel F. Sennott, said to be the largest ever in attendance at a fireman's funeral, escorted the body from the home of his mother, 38 Winthrop st. to the church. The body was carried into the church by bearers comprising deputy and district chiefs. Commissioner Glynn and Chief Sennott preceded the remains and then came the wife and two sons of District Chief McDonough, his mother, brothers and sisters and other relatives. There were about 300 officers and firemen in the escort.

Solemn requiem high mass was celebrated, at 9 by Rev James L. Davey, assisted by Rev James A. Donnelly, as deacon; Rev James H. Phalen, subdeacon, and Rev M. J. Murphy, master of ceremonies. Seated in the sanctuary were Rev Dr John W. McMahon, pastor of St Mary's Church; Rev John V. Cronan, pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes Church, Beachmont; Rev Edward A. McDonough, chaplain of St Elizabeth's Hospital, and Rev M. J. Norton of St Paul's Church, Dorchester.

Schmidt's requiem mass was sung by the church choir, with Mrs Josephine Gillen, soprano; Mrs Mollie Ott, alto; Albert Lambert, tenor, and Joseph P. Hyland, bass. James M. McLaughlin was organist.

Ushers at the church were uniformed firemen, including John Regan, John Carr and Thomas Holland of Engine 3, John Horgan of Engine 6, James Kan-

of Engine 4, John Morrissey of Engine 6, William Farley of Ladder 8, Edward G. Gillespie and James J. Eagan of Ladder 2, Patrick Buckley of Ladder 1, Joseph Shea of Ladder 24, Martin Johnson of Engine 31 and Joseph Smith of Engine 50.

During the services at the church, District Chief McDonough's fire cap laid on the casket.

In the volunteer detail attending the funeral were all the members of Engine Company 4, at which the late District Chief McDonough had his headquarters.

From the church, headed by Fire Commissioner Glynn, Chief Sennott and Deputy Chief Joseph A. Dolan, the procession marched passed the home of Chief McDonough on Soley st; the home of his mother, brothers and sisters, 38 Winthrop st, and Engine Company 50, where the apparatus was drawn to the sidewalk and members, under command of Capt Maurice Galvin, stood at attention. The bell of the chief's auto tolled during the passing.

Traffic was stopped on Warren and Park sts and City sq until the funeral cortege passed and hundreds stood and watched from the sidewalks. At Cambridge and Charles sts, the men of Ladder 24 and at Mt Vernon and Charles sts, those of Engine 10 stood at attention. At each fire station the bells were tolled. The detail then parted ranks and the procession passed on its way to St Joseph's Cemetery, West Roxbury.

District Chief McDonough is survived by his wife, who was Mary C. McGuire; two sons, William and Frank; his mother, Mrs Mary L. McDonough; two sisters, Miss Florence McDonough, Boston schoolteacher, and Mrs Walter Haley of Charlestown, and two brothers, Lieut Frank McDonough of Tower 1, and William McDonough, instructor in the Sherwood School.
